Preparing For Your Doctor's Appointment

First step, if not already done, is to ask your family physician to test you for lyme and several other vector-borne illnesses. Lyme, anaplasmosis, babesiosis are all reportable and present in Manitoba. Borrelia miyamotoi is an emerging borrelia infection and should be considered. Other strains (eg European / Asian) strains should also be considered and tested for. Different criteria are used in determining positive or negative for the European and Asian strains.

Take the Manitoba Health Physicians Letter with you. It highlights the reportable tick-borne diseases in Manitoba as well as their symptoms, etc. To find the letter, visit the Manitoba Health website. The Physicians update is usually at the top of the "For Health Care Providers" section. TICC Service

We are fortunate to now have a Tick Collaborative Care Service (TICC) in Winnipeg with Dr. Stephen Goulet (Internal Medicine Specialist) as the lead. For information about the TICC Service, it's purpose and how to get referred, please visit their website at https://professionals.wrha.mb.ca/tick-collaborative-care-service/. Although one does not have to have a positive lyme test (only symptoms), a referral from one's family physician is required. If your family physician refuses to refer you, the TICC Service has put a "Reverse Referral Process" in place. Instructions on how that works is on their website. For those with children with suspected lyme, should it be necessary the TICC Service can also help connect you to a Pediatrician who is familiar with lyme disease.

There is a waiting list to get into the Clinic, so you may wish to approach your family physician to provide you with treatment as outlined on the Manitoba Health website even if your mainstream tests come back negative. It is important to note that a negative test does not rule out lyme or the possibility of other tick-borne infections. If your family doctor is open to investigating other treatment options on your behalf such as those from the International Lyme and Associated Diseases Society (ILADS), a link to Ilads can be found on the Public Health Agency of Canada website at For health professionals: Lyme disease - Canada.ca. Scroll down towards the bottom of the page. The Ilads link can be found under the section "For More Information – International Guidelines".

If your doctor is unwilling to treat you without a positive test result, but you are anxious to embark on some kind of treatment while you wait to get into the clinic, you may wish to consider seeking out a good Naturopathic Doctor. They have access to private labs that specialize in vector-borne testing. The ND's can also provide treatment options other than antibiotics. They are also helpful at providing important support while undergoing antibiotic treatment. However, all of this costs money even though some aspects may be covered depending on what kind of health coverage you have. Two of the primary lyme Naturopathic doctors in Winnipeg are Dr. Jason Bachewich (The Nature Doctors) and Dr. Dean Schrader (The Centre For Natural Medicine). Here are links to their websites. The private labs that are most typically used by the ND's are Armin Labs, Germany

(<u>www.arminlabs.com</u>) and Igenex in California (<u>www.igenex.com</u>). They do require a doctor's requisition (ND or MD). One would then have their blood drawn and then shipped off to the lab. You could check to see if your family doctor would be willing to fill out the requisition but if not, you would have to make an appointment with a Naturopathic doctor. The Naturopathic doctor can help guide you on which tests to order based on your symptoms.
